PETA Urges AKC to Take Action to Stop Tail-Docking, Ear-Cropping, Genetic Defects

Raleigh, N.C. -- In the wake of the American Veterinary Medical Association's recent announcement that it condemns cropping the ears and docking the tails of dogs as breed standards, PETA has sent an urgent letter to American Kennel Club (AKC) President and CEO Dennis Sprung urging him to ban these painful mutilations. PETA is also calling on the AKC to alter breed standards in order to discourage breeding dogs for traits that cause debilitating health problems (such as long ears which are prone to infection) and genetic defects that can result in painful skin conditions, bone problems, and heart failure, among many other problems.

In its letter, PETA points out that the AKC's British counterpart, The Kennel Club, is currently examining and revising standards for 209 breeds and has already changed the breed standard for Pekingese dogs, whose flat faces often cause breathing probl ems and make the animals prone to overheating.

"Breed standards that encourage dogs' ears and tails to be chopped off have already caused enough suffering," says PETA Vice President Daphna Nachminovitch. *** "When breeders attempt to create exact replicas within breeds, they help perpetuate inherited diseases that doom dogs to a lifetime of suffering and their guardians to an avalanche of vet bills."

Dear Membership,

Please check your Poodles' database listings on OFA www.offa.org to make certain their variety is designated. The OFA submission forms do not request the variety, so often it is not noted by the owner when filling out the paperwork. The dog must have the variety determined to be eligible for the CHIC* designation. Also, always make certain to have your veterinarian(s) check the microchip or tattoo so that positive ID can be verified when doing each of the tests by a veterinarian. The owner should double check that the veterinarian has checked the ID and signed that they have done that verification. The CERF positive ID is also up to the owners to make certain the positive ID is noted on the submission form for CERF so that it will count towards the CHIC.

Positive ID not noted or variety not determined are the two important issues I see on the database that keep tested dogs from missing out on the CHIC determination. You can rectify the missing variety notation with an e-mail to ofa@offa.org.

POODLE GROOMING—MORE GROOMING TIPS FOR PROFESSIONALS

Like many other long coated breeds hair shed can and often does remain in the under coat until it is removed by proper brushing and combing. Hair shed not removed will, with time or immediately upon getting damp or wet, begin to "tangle" and "matt" whereby the hair shed both wraps and compresses around the existing hair coat. Mats simply ruin the beauty of the Poodle coat, and severe matting causes any pet discomfort and even poor skin health. Remember well, the same trim style will look different on a black, chocolate, apricot or white Poodle.

Create a photo album of the various Poodle styles you offer to show owners asking for recommendations. Because the same trim style can look different on Poodles of various coat colors, your pictures of say a "Royal Dutch" should illustrate the style on at least a black Poodle and a white Poodle.

Beware! All across the U.S. and the world, the name of a trim style varies. For example, a "Kennel Clip" often implies full body coat removal to most groomers of the West Coast (U.S.), but to the East Coast it means nothing of the sort. Remember, coat care starts at home, not at the groomers, and grooming appointments

She received her first rally excellent leg in Yuma and completed her rally excellent title in Long Beach, CA, in December. Ladybug completed 2 rally and 1 obedience title within 2 months!

Lidos As Slick As It Gets, also a creamy apricot mini and littermate to Jason, was bred by Susie and her mother, Betty Osburn and is owned by Susie and her husband, Bruce Napols. Practical Dental Care For Dogs

A healthy mouth smells better.

Does it smell pretty awful when your dog breathes in your face? That's a clue there may be something pretty awful going on in his mouth.

A healthy mouth feels better.

Even if you are very perceptive, you probably won't notice your pet's toothache unless one side of the mouth hurts more than the other, making him or her chew only on one side. Because dental problems develop gradually, it is easy to miss the other signs, like reluctance to eat or lack of activity, until things are pretty bad.

Pets with healthy mouths live longer.

Pets with healthy teeth and gums enjoy their lives more. They are happier and play more. They get more exercise. Twenty years ago, we expected large breed dogs to live nine or ten years. Today, with luck, it's reasonable to expect eleven to thirteen years. Some of it of course, is better nutrition and medical care. Much of it I think, is improved dental health. Without dental attention, most dogs have infected smelly mouths by the time they are six or seven. Twenty four hours a day, that infection sheds bacteria into the bloodstream. Is that fatal? Of course not. The body is good at dealing with this kind of thing, but it stresses the immune system. As time goes on the bacterial load worsens and with age the immune system becomes progressively less competent. By eight or nine we have a old failing dog with kidney disease, liver problems and a mouth that can be salvaged only by removing most of the teeth. That doesn't have to happen.

New Brunswick Veterinary Medical Association Bans Cropping and Docking

The Canadian Kennel Club (CKC) has learned that the New Brunswick Veterinary Medical Association, at their Annual General Meeting this past weekend, banned the practice of docking and cropping. We understand the NBVMA have, by way of formal motion, announced that the practice of ear cropping, tail docking and dew claw removal can no longer be performed by veterinarians licensed to practice in that province. The issue is significant and raises concern for breeders where cropping and docking is common practice within their breed.

The impact of this new prohibition will negatively impact on a number of practical levels. It is now logical to believe and we acknowledge that, in order to adhere to some existing breed standards, individuals will seek service outside the province of New Brunswick. We also acknowledge and express concern that unskilled individuals may perform these surgeries and cause significant harm to their animals.

A special committee has been established to deal with both of the noted issues and to further consider this matter within the context of a changing social perspective. Please review the
